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Abstract

This non-refereed contribution to the special issue of *Journal of Education and Research* is a joint reflective notewhich describes the personal contexts and experiences of the two Masters of Ceremony at the First International Conference on Transformative Education Re search and Sustainable Development (TERSD) held on 21-23 October 2016 in Dhulikhel, Nepal.We, one after the other, without any formal background to the paper, relate our own individual experiences and learning of the event.
